# BIOSECURITY Recommendations for Exhibitors



## **BEFORE THE EXHIBITION**

- **1. Confirm with organizers** for eventspecific exhibition requirements before the event.
- 2. While HPAI has not been reported in beef cattle, it is advisable to

familiarize yourself with signs of influenza in cattle (e.g., decreased milk production, appetite, and rumen motility, thick or discolored milk, lethargy, fever, and/or dehydration, signs of mastitis in 1 or more quarters, dry manure, constipation, nasal discharges, or diarrhea in some cases) and do not participate in an animal event if any clinical signs is present in your cattle.

- 3. Avoid comingling animals from different premises/farms. Animals from different herds should be transported separately to minimize the risk of crosscontamination.
- 4. Work with your herd veterinarian to ensure the animals:
  - are not showing any clinical signs of potential infectious, contagious, or communicable disease.
  - are in good health and have received vaccination against common diseases (e.g., BVD, IBR, BRSV, and PI3).

- **5. Clean and disinfect** all equipment that you plan to bring to the event (e.g., feed equipment, cleaning tools, grooming equipment, inside and outside of vehicles and trailers, portable milking equipment, etc.) using safe and approved disinfectants.
- 6. Ensure that when attending an exhibition, you do not have any symptoms of respiratory illness and that you have not traveled outside Canada or visited a HPAI A (H5N1) positive farm in the last 72 hours prior the event.



### BY ADHERING TO THESE RECOMMENDATIONS

 Beef cattle exhibitors can help protect their animals and ensure a safe and healthy environment for all participants at the shows.



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## **DURING THE EXHIBITION**

- **1. Report any animal health concerns** to the organizers immediately. It is recommended that organizers have a veterinarian on-site or on-call to handle any animal health concerns or emergencies. See the <u>Canadian Food</u> Inspection Agency Guidance for veterinarians.
- 2. Do not share equipment or personnel with other exhibitors and avoid close contact with other exhibitor's animals. If equipment is shared, make sure to clean and disinfect between every use.

#### 3. Put in place measures to:

- prevent/minimize nose-to-nose contact with other livestock.
- minimize animal-to-human contact. avoid use of communal water sources.
- minimize animal stress by keeping them cool and comfortable, and providing food and water.
- manage manure and bedding (e.g., established cleanable manure collection sites that contain bedding/manure/urine.
- **4. Follow** the event organizers guidance for biosecurity measures, including measure for raw milk handling and disposal.

- 5. Make sure that animals' handlers:
  - Wash their hands and wear disposable gloves.
  - Use only clean clothes and clean boots when interacting with and between animals at the fair. Do not use the same clothes to care for the animals at home and at the fair.
  - Thoroughly clean and disinfect boots, clothing, and all equipment, including transport vehicles, before you bring it back on your farm (in contact with the rest of your herd).
  - Consider using a well-fitting mask such as N95 when in contact with the animals and stay home if they have any signs of illness.
- **6. Do not** feed other animals with raw milk and do not drink or offer raw milk to visitors.
- **7. Dispose of** used PPE at the organizer's designated PPE collection points immediately after use to prevent contamination and minimize exposure risks.



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### **AFTER THE EXHIBITION**

### **BEFORE RETURNING HOME**

- Dispose of unused bedding, hay, and feed, clean and disinfect all equipment (tack, buckets, shovels, wheelbarrows, clothing, and footwear).
- 2. Dispose of single-use gloves, masks, eye protection and boot covers, if used.
- 3. Wash your hands thoroughly with soap and water after handling anything that was in contact with animals. Use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol if soap and water is not available.

### WHEN YOU ARRIVE HOME

- **1. Wash** your hands thoroughly with soap and water.
- **2. Shower,** blow your nose, and put on clean clothes and shoes.
- **3. Clean** and disinfect vehicles and trailers used to transport animals when back home from the exhibition.
- **4. Feed** and work with returning animals last, and have separate equipment (forks, shovels, buckets, etc.) for these animals.
- **5. Wear** different clothes and boots when working with returned animals.

REMEMBER, good biosecurity helps stop the spread of germs to your farm and keeps you and your livestock healthy!
