

Farmed Animal Health and Welfare 2020 (2014)





Focus

Antimicrobial Stewardship Activities of Stakeholders Progress on recommendations from Antimicrobial Stewardship in Food Animals in Canada – 2016

Outcome

- Antimicrobial Stewardship in Food Animals in Canada published in 2016 is the reference document.
- Considered the pan-Canadian AMR Framework development
- Will provide a baseline for the pan-Canadian Action Plan



AMU/AMR Next Steps

- Support the panCanadian Action Plan
- Collectively advance AMR initiatives in collaboration with the commodity groups and veterinary groups
- Determine role of the Council in conjunction with various stakeholders to support the pan Canadian Framework and Action plan without duplicating effort.

One Welfare

As a concept "One Welfare" is a call to recognize the many social interconnections between human welfare, animal welfare and the integrity of the environment. In practice, it is also a call for a coordinated program of action:

- to improve animal welfare in order to improve human welfare (and vice versa),
- to co-ordinate actions between animal protection and other services, and
- to protect the environment as a fundamental step for both human and animal welfare.



One Welfare

 After supporting the first International One Welfare Conference in Winnipeg in 2017, the Council is sponsoring the second International One Welfare Conference to be held in Sydney Australia, 2019.

- Council expanded the One Welfare
 Committee to engage representatives from the Canadian Federation of
 Agriculture, Domore Ag, and the crop industry.
- The Committee has engaged in discussion on how to address:
 - Existing programs needs in Canada
 - The needs of producers, farm staff, service providers and veterinary personnel in the agriculture community were considered



One Welfare Consultation

Consultation on One Welfare: To determine how to raise awareness of the benefits of involving medical and social services in cases of serious breakdown in animal care, and in special circumstances such as disease outbreaks and disasters, and how best to secure such services when they are needed

Topics of Discussion:

- One Welfare National Goals Securing Social Services in a crisis
- What would the ideal One Welfare framework look like in Canada?
- Who needs to be engaged and how?
- How do we ensure support is sustainable?

Graham Clark Study – GF2 – joint collaboration with NFAHWC and the LMISSC

Key Issues:

- · Lack of freezer capacity
- Labor regulations
- Size and species required
- Diseased vs welfare cull
- Compensation
- · Regulator co-ordination

Next Steps:

- Survey to validate the report
- · Survey to identify willing facilities and capacity



Emerging Issues

Table Top Exercise

- Designed an "unknown" disease tabletop exercise
- Goal to explore determination of roles and responsibilities and ensure effective communication in an "unknown" disease event
- Working with partners such as CAHC to identify roll out opportunities

Council Animal Welfare Law Recommendations

- The National Farmed Animal Health and Welfare Council made 8 recommendations to enhance animal welfare law in Canada
- Recommendations were presented to the Federal, Provincial and Territorial Regulatory Assistant Deputy Ministers in October 2018

- 2012 Advisory statement:
 - 22 recommendations
- 2015 Follow-up study by Jeffrey Spooner
- 2018 Progress Report

- Engage a Committee with a broad representation of stakeholders
- Apply FAHW 2020 tools and lessons learned to report on stakeholder animal health and welfare activities under the Plant and Animal Health Strategy
- Critical to maintain the welfare strategy components from FAHW 2020



CAHSS Transition to Council



A New Opportunity for Collaboration

- Funding application submitted to sustain CAHSS under the Council
- Interim funding for 2018 from CFIA

Outcome

- Enhanced role of Council in supporting CAHSS
- Transition working group to implement the transition
- Shared Government and Industry Role



Animal Health Canada

A New Opportunity for Collaboration

Council Will Provide Support to Animal Health Canada Through:

- secretariat support
- financial management
- creation of a Committee

The role of the Council may continue to evolve as Animal Health Canada begins to solidify



AHEM-II

- Canadian Animal Health Coalition CAP project proposal
- Intended to provide support to continue to enhance emergency preparedness and response capacity for industry in Canada
- Opportunity to support some of the activities of Animal Health Canada



AHEM-II: Animal Health Emergency Management Awareness, Capacity, Confidence (Canadian Animal Health Coalition)

Investment: \$4.5M Timeline: 2018 to 2023

Outcomes / Activities

- Develops industry awareness of roles & responsibilities, and tools at hand
 - Awareness tools, brochures & workshops
- Enhances industry capacity to partner with government and effectively prepared / respond
 - Association-level PLANS and producer-level HANDBOOKS
 - Industry / government AHEM partnerships
 - Regional / sectoral AHEM councils
 - · Protocols addressing known policy gaps
 - FAD courseware for practitioners
- Enhances market confidence in Canada's ability to survive major livestock disease events




Animal AMS Canada
